Since World War I,

Over 110 million people
around the world have died in war.

The number continues to rise in
Ukraine, Russia, Palestine, etc.,

People die regardless of nationalities,
civilians or soldiers, allies or enemies.

Inspired by Okinawa's "Cornerstone of Peace,"

we aim to build an online memorial

to record the names of all
who have perished in war.

This is the
Global
"Cornerstone of Peace."

This will serve as a foundation and
starting point for us to build a unified world
— as a world federation,
or as a fundamentally transformed United Nations.

To realize this vision,

we propose joint efforts involving bereaved families, citizens, local
governments, in Okinawa, across Japan, and around the world,
including the United Nations.

No more unnecessary violence on behalf of other countries.

A world without war?

What a dream?

Can we ever make that happen?

Yes, we can!

In fact,
it's already happening!

-The path to a lasting peace has long been envisioned
by our predecessors and leaders and lawmakers-

1795

Philosopher Immanuel Kant published Perpetual Peace, advocating, "There is no other way than that a nation, like an individual, should give up its lawless freedom, adjust itself to public coercive laws, and thus form a union of nations."

1945

Emery Reves published The Anatomy of Peace, calling for a world federation based on global law. Dr. Einstein and Dr. Hideki Yukawa supported the idea, sparking a world federalist movement in Japan, Okinawa, and across the globe.

The Diet of Japan passed resolutions unanimously as below.

August 2, 2005 – House of Representatives

May 25, 2016 – House of Councilors

The House of Councilors declared, "...the government must strive to explore ways to realize a world federation that includes human security... and make utmost efforts."

(Votes: 229 in favor, 0 opposed)

We fully support this resolution.

What is now Japan was torn apart by endless conflict during the era of the Warring States.

Now, war within Japan is unimaginable.

Europe, once devastated by centuries of bloodshed, has formed the European Union and abolished war within its borders.

In Asia, ASEAN has followed a similar path. These regions are choosing unity through consensus—

Step by step, we are moving toward integration.

Yet wars still persist on Earth, because we remain divided, hostile, and threatening to one another.

Becoming one—

This is humanity's greatest challenge.
